

While LB Memorial's mission hasn't changed since 1907, providing healthcare has done so dramatically. John Bishop, CEO of LB Memorial, Miller's Children's & Women's Hospital LB and Community Hospital LB, described how provider partnerships continue to grow to achieve economies of scale and to provide integrated delivery healthcare systems. What determines an individual's health is mostly by social determinants (social-economic factors like education,

transportation, violence, food, residence location). For instance, there is a 7-year life span differential based on where you live in Long Beach. Bishop feels the community/country needs to fix what we have so as to not reward providers when patients are treated, but when illness is prevented.

Dr. Steve Hryniewicki (Internal Medicine) was introduced as our 2nd new member of the year by Jerry Bloeser. Sathya Chey was awarded her Blue Badge. Bob Bond celebrated his birthday with an Austin Power impersonation.

Craig Cross introduced the Newell Family Scholarship awardees. off the flow of pills. A former Purdue Pharma (maker of OxyContin) executive, who monitored pharmacies for criminal activity, acknowledged that even when the company had evidence pharmacies were colluding with drug dealers, it did not stop supplying distributors selling to those stores. More than 1 million OxyContin pills ended up in the hands of criminals and addicts. Since 1999, more than 194,000 people have died from overdoses involving opioid painkillers, including OxyContin. This is a widespread problem not restricted by age, race, gender.
